2020 全國大專校院英文演講暨高中生英文詩歌朗誦競賽

活動簡章

一、活動目的

台美往來交流頻繁,舉凡語言、飲食、政治、教育、流行文化均有相當程度的交互影響,加上近年來國人赴美免簽政策 實施,大大增進台美人民的文化交流機會。在全球化速度漸增的大環境下,學生英文能力之養成將提升學生未來在職場 上的競爭力與發展,且其對於全球共通語言的熟稔亦將助益台灣及美國人民間的溝通。為培養學生英文表達組織能力、 提供學生一個交流觀摩平台並增加本校能見度,本校特從 2013 年起舉辦本競賽。2013 到 2015 年以「從台灣觀點看美國 /The United States of America, as Viewed from Taiwan」為題; 2016 年的演講主題為「美國與台灣的文化對話/ Cultural Dialogue between The United States and Taiwan」;2017 的演講主題為「文化交流: 圍牆與橋樑/ Cultural Interchange: Walls and Bridges」。期望透過這些主題鼓勵學生探討台美文化交流的多元層面以及文化差異並相互欣賞與包容。2018 為慶祝 台美關係邁向 40 周年,特訂主題為「美國與台灣: 立穩根基·共創未來/U.S. and Taiwan: Strong Foundation-Bright Future」,呼應美國在臺協會於 2018 年舉辦的回顧展與系列活動,鼓勵學生探究台美關係的歷史脈絡與未來發展,以增 進台美文化交流與合作情谊。2019 年演講主題為「U.S. and Taiwan: Our Future Environment」,延續前一年主題,探討面 向為鼓勵學生關注「環境」層面的問題,關注台灣與美國對於「環境」的看法。2020 年則訂定「U.S. and Taiwan: Learning from Each Other」,期許透過互相學習,了解彼此文化與差異,包容並蓄,強化台美關係。由於歷年舉辦之賽事 皆獲得好評且報名踴躍,2017 年起大專組新增組別以開放英語相關科系的學生參賽,高中組則改為英文詩歌朗誦競賽。 期許藉此競賽吸引更多學子親臨本校,並在競賽中培養學生國際觀,讓學生在比賽過程中練習穩定台風並增進口語表達 技巧。

2020 College English Speech Competition & High School English Poetry Recitation Competition

I. Introduction

• Objectives

Taiwan and the United States of America are connected by shared values and by a shared interest in each other's language, food, politics, education, and popular culture. The implementation of visafree travel to the United States has further increased opportunities for mutual cultural exchange. In the context of ever-increasing globalization, Taiwanese students who can express themselves well in English gain increased global awareness, as well as a considerable competitive advantage in the job market.

To further opportunities for cultural exchange, the Department of Foreign Languages and Literature of National Sun Yat-sen University has since 2013 organized an annual English Speech Competition. The theme for the first three years' competitions was "The United States of America, as Viewed from Taiwan"; the 2016 theme was "Cultural Dialogue between the United States and Taiwan"; the 2017 theme was "Cultural Interchange: Walls and Bridges"; the 2018 theme was "U.S. and Taiwan: Strong Foundation-Bright Future." These themes have worked successfully as bases for discussion where students could share their own observations on the cultural relationship between the United States and Taiwan. The competitions have been very successful, with higher numbers of students participating each year and overwhelmingly positive feedback. We expect this to be the case for the upcoming 2020 competition as well. In 2019, we have selected the theme, "U.S. and Taiwan: Our Future Environment." Students are encouraged to focus on a specific aspect of "environment" and bring thoughtful attention to it with an eye to how the US and Taiwan may be like or unlike in their approaches or ways of thinking. In 2020, "U.S. and Taiwan: Learning from Each Other" will be the topic. We hope to learn from each other, understand cultures and differences, be inclusive, share our insights, and strengthen the relationship between the United State and Taiwan. Through participation in this competition, students will have the opportunity to develop a more global perspective, to cultivate their composure and public speaking skills, and to improve their command of English.

Since 2017, we have opened a new division in the competition, for undergraduate English language majors. Moreover, the high school group will be working as individuals to recite and share their interpretations of selected English poems. In this more rigorous competition, these students will refine English presentation skills that will help them prepare for professional work in English.

III. Procedure

- The contest is divided into three groups:
 - College level, non-English majors, working in teams or as individuals to present on the topic, "U.S. and Taiwan: Learning from Each Other."
 - 2. College level, English majors, working as individuals to present on the topic, "U.S. and Taiwan: Learning from Each Other."
 - 3. High school level students, working as individuals to recite and share their interpretations of selected English poems.

Contestants will be judged based on their presentation content, English fluency, and deportment, with the winners receiving awards and prizes. To encourage student participation and to express the organizers' appreciation for the contestants' instructors, all finalists will receive certificates of participation, and all instructors will receive letters of appreciation.

• College English Presentation: "U.S. and Taiwan: Learning from Each Other."

Geographically, the US and Taiwan are far apart, but in other respects they are very close. This because the two have paid careful attention to each other and learned from each other. There is a mutual sympathy between the two and that has made mutual exchange in practices and ideas a constant in the relationship. In matters of politics the U.S. has been a huge influence on how Taiwan operates: the ideas of the American Revolution--democracy, freedom, individual rights--that shaped the U.S. in the second half of the eighteenth century helped shape Taiwan in the second half of the twentieth century. And as Taiwan came into its own as a prosperous society, it offered the U.S. much to admire and learn from. Taiwan set up and managed health care for all citizens, developed a high-tech industry that is the envy of the world, and is far ahead in developing green transportation solutions such as electric scooters. In these an many other aspects—popular culture, education, food, arts, and many others—the U.S. and Taiwan are engaged in a continuous and mutually beneficial process of learning from each other.

The College English Presentation for non-English majors will consist of brief presentation for teams of one or two students. Power Point or other visual aids may be used if desired. The College English Presentation for English majors will consist of prepared remarks by individual students, with no visual aids, followed by a follow-up discussion with the panel of judges.

• <u>High School Poetry Recitation:</u>

For the High School Poetry Recitation, contestants will choose and recite a poem from a collection of 10 American or British poems selected by the contest organizers. These poems are of comparable lengths and degrees of difficulty; contestants will be judged based on their understanding of the poem and their ability to interpret it in an engaging manner. Before contestants begin reciting, they will be asked to introduce their chosen poem by explaining its context, meaning, and personal appeal.

The High School Poetry Recitation is an activity for individual students. Contestants may not use audio-visual aids.

• Eligibility

% All contestants must meet the following requirements:

College Group

Participants in the non-English major speech competition contest must be:

- Undergraduate students currently studying a non-English major at a University/ University of Technology/ Institute of Technology in Taiwan.
 (Students from foreign language-related departments, departments of translation, and those minoring in or double majoring in language-related departments are not eligible.)
- 2) Current students who have ROC nationality, official student status, and whose mother tongue is not English.
- 3) Students who have never lived or studied in any English-speaking country for six months or longer.
- 4) Students who have not studied in a district English/bilingual school for more than three years in total since the age of six.
- 5) Entries must consist of individuals or teams of two (who must be from the same school), formed either voluntarily or by their school.
- 6) Registration deadlines may be subjected to early termination or extension.
- 7) The number of participants in the final round is set at 15.
- 8) Students who feel that the question of their eligibility is not adequately covered by the regulations given above, can appeal to the discretion of the contest organizers for a final decision.

Participants in the English major individual speech contest must be:

1) Undergraduate students currently studying at a University/University of

Technology/Institute of Technology in Taiwan.

- 2) Current students who have ROC nationality, official student status, and whose mother tongue is not English.
- 3) Students who have never lived or studied in any English-speaking country for six months or longer.
- 4) Students who have never studied in a district English/bilingual school for more than three years in total since the age of six.
- 5) Students must participate individually, either self-selected or selected by their school.
- 6) Registration deadlines may be subjected to early termination or extension.
- 7) The number of participants in the final round is set at 15.
- 8) Students who feel that the question of their eligibility is not adequately covered by the regulations given above, can appeal to the discretion of the contest organizers for a final decision.

High School Group

Participants in the poetry recitation must be:

- High school students currently studying in public/private high schools in Taiwan. (Grade 1-3 junior college students are included.)
- 2) Current students who have ROC nationality, official student status, and whose mother tongue is not English.
- 3) Students who have never lived or studied in English-speaking countries for six months or longer.
- 4) Students who have never studied in a district English/bilingual school or an English speaking country (this includes exchange programs, studying abroad, and study tours) for six months or longer.
- 5) Students who are selected by their respective schools.
 - (Home-schooled students, according to the Non-School Mode Regulation of Experimental Education, can sign up for the competition. On the home-schooled student's registration form, he or she has to replace the Official School Seal and Teacher's Signature with the City Government Education Bureau's official seal and the guardian's signature.)
- 6) Students must be registered under the name of their schools. (Please note that only 1 to 5 contestant(s) from each school will be accepted.)
- 7) Registration deadlines may be subjected to early termination or extension.
- 8) The number of participants in the final round is set at 15.
- 9) Students who feel that the question of their eligibility is not adequately covered by the regulations given above, can appeal to the discretion of the contest organizers for a final decision.
- The contest will be conducted in two phases: a preliminary round, and a final round.

Preliminary Phase

In the preliminary phase, a **three-minute** video (for high school participants, an individual recitation of an English poem; for non-English major college students, a short English speech; for English major college students, an individual speech) must be sent to the **combined organizers, the Department of Foreign Languages and Literature and English Teaching Center at National Sun Yat-sen University** via post by the indicated deadline. Applicants for the college-level contests determine their own presentation titles, the contents of which must be relevant to the contest theme. Applicants for the high school poetry recitation must choose a poem from the selection provided. The scoring criteria of the preliminary phase are the same as those of the final (see below). 15 teams/persons in each respective group will be selected for the final.

※ The three-minute video must be recorded in one-shot without any form of post-production, such as film-editing, background music, narration, or subtitles. The use of a microphone is forbidden, so please pay heed to the quality and volume of voice recording. The competition participants should dress formally. Wearing uniforms is not permitted.

Final Phase

***** The competition title/chosen poem for the final phase must be identical to the one used in the preliminary application phase. The contestants selected as finalists must be the ones who applied in the preliminaries.

College Group

Non-English Majors

- 1) Presentation time: 10 minutes in total (7 minutes for presentation, 3 minutes for Q&A).
- 2) Participants decide their own topics and presentation content, both of which must be relevant to the contest theme.
- 3) All participating team members must present; non-contestants may not participate in or assist during the competition.
- 4) Visual aids such as PowerPoint and props are allowed, but notes or scripts are prohibited.
- 5) Quoted sources must be cited appropriately.
- 6) Videos for the preliminary round must be playable on Windows Media Player.
- 7) Presentation files must be in English, and saved in PowerPoint for Windows Office.
- 8) Please dress formally. Wearing uniforms is not permitted.

 English speech skills and expression (pronunciation, intonation, fluency, accuracy, Q&A performance, etc.): 40% 2) Content of presentation (relevance, creativity, structure, visual design): 40%

3) Performance (coordination of members, body language, costume, deportment): 20%
※ If two groups receive the same score, their rankings will be determined by their respective scores in (1) English speech skills & expression and (2) the content of their respective presentations.

• English Majors

- 1) Presentation time: 8 minutes in total (5 minutes for presentation, 3 minutes for Q&A).
- 2) Participants decide their own topics and presentation content, both of which must be relevant to the contest theme.
- 3) Notes and scripts are prohibited.
- 4) Videos for the preliminary round must be playable on Windows Media Player.
- 5) Please dress formally. Wearing uniforms is not permitted.

Criteria

- 1) English speech skills and expression (pronunciation, intonation, fluency, accuracy, Q&A performance, etc.): 40%
- 2) Content of presentation (relevance, creativity, structure, visual design): 40%
- 3) Performance (coordination of members, body language, costume, deportment): 20%

X If two groups receive the same score, their rankings will be determined by their respective scores in (1) English speech skills & expression and (2) the content of their respective presentations.

High School Group: English Poetry Recitation

- 1) Recitation time: 9 minutes in total (6 minutes to recite, 3 minutes for Q&A)
- 2) Participants select a poem from the collection provided.
- 3) The use of audio-visual aids is not allowed. Notes or scripts are prohibited.
- 4) Videos for the preliminary round must be playable on Windows Media Player.
- 5) Please dress formally. Wearing uniforms is not permitted.

Criteria

- 1) English expressive abilities (pronunciation, intonation, fluency, accuracy, etc.): 40%
- 2) Understanding of the poem as evidenced by introduction and recitation: 40%
- 3) Performance (body language, deportment): 20%
- * If two groups receive the same score, the ranking will be determined by the higher scores
- of (1) English expressive abilities and (2) understanding of the poem.

IV. Awards

Each contestant will receive a certificate of participation. After all participants have finished, judges will select the top three entries, two outstanding entries, and three superior entries for each group.

- 1. First Prize: Each contestant receives NT\$6,000 or an equivalent prize and a certificate of award.
- 2. Second Prize: Each contestant receives NT\$4,000 or an equivalent prize and a certificate of award.
- 3. Third Prize: Each contestant receives NT\$3,000 or an equivalent prize and a certificate of award.
- 4. Outstanding Prize: Each contestant receives NT\$1,000 or an equivalent prize and a certificate of award.
- 5. Superior Prize: Each contestant receives NT\$300 or an equivalent prize and a certificate of award.
